

It is: (i) Further and higher than the pre-Pentecostal experience of the Spirit	need to be kept in mind. (i) It is something that is further and higher than the experience of the Spirit known before the Day of Pentecost. It is higher than an Old Testament level of receiving the Spirit. It is higher than the pre-Pentecostal experience of the Spirit known by the disciples. It is greater than new birth. (ii) It is strongly experiential. An abundant 'outpouring' of the Spirit is a matter of conscious experience. (iii) In the New Testament (which cannot totally control our interpretation here, but may make a contribution) it is associated with power, giftedness, liberty-of-action, liberty, joy, prayerfuness, boldness.
(ii) Experiential (iii) Associated with power, liberty, joy, prayerfulness and boldness	A second question will be: how precisely do we take such a passage as this to ourselves? I answer: it is partly a matter of the distant future when the very physical universe will be glorified by the Holy Spirit. Yet we must remember that Old Testament prophecy is panoramic and futuristic. It looks to everything that will happen and it takes in the final accomplishment of God's purposes. But along the way we have foretastes of the glory that is to come. Although the

foretastes	When the Holy Spirit is poured out there will be immense fertility. The open country becomes a garden-land; the garden-land becomes like a forest.
The Holy Spirit gives:	¹⁶ Justice will dwell in the open country and righteousness live in the garden-land.
Immense fertility	There will be great peace. The fertility will follow righteousness. Peace will follow righteousness.
Great peace	¹⁷ The fruit of righteousness will be peace; the effect of righteousness will be restfulness and confidence for ever.
	Then Isaiah puts to us a picture of fertility.
	¹⁸ My people will live in peaceful dwelling places, in secure homes,
	in undisturbed places of rest. ¹⁹ Though hail flattens the forest and the city is levelled completely,
	²⁰ how blessed you will be, sowing your seed by every stream,
	and letting your cattle and donkeys range free.
• Abundant blessings follow righteousness	The picture is one where abundant blessings follow righteousness. When men and women are righteous in the eyes of God, the Spirit may be given to them. The result will be the blessings of the Holy Spirit pictured here as material prosperity. In the Lord Jesus Christ we shall find a peaceful dwelling-place
• A peaceful dwelling-place in Jesus	for our conscience. In the knowledge of God's salvation we shall find God's restfulness. Despite what calamities may strike our planet God's blessings follow his people. We shall enjoy knowing that God is pleased with us. We shall have a sense of fulfilment. We will have a good conscience. 'Sowing seed by every stream' puts to us a picture of immense opportunity plus abundance of 'aveit' which to take over a construction.'
• Eventually we shall find ourselves in a glorified world	'seed' with which to take every opportunity. Yet there is no need to take the passage exclusively as a spiritual picture. One day it will be quite literal. We have flashes of glory along the way by the Holy Spirit. But eventually we shall find ourselves in a glorified world.
