Part 49

Coming Home to Zion (35:1-10)

- 1. There is coming a new world altogether, and we may taste it even now
- When God's people are blessed even creation rejoices over them
- We can get some of the final vision fulfilled before we get to the end
- God can work for us to give abundant blessings
- Deserts can become green
- Believers can see the glorious character of God
- 2. We should encourage each other to press forward to get as much of that new world as we can even now
- Every miracle is a sign of spiritual as well as physical blessing

- 1. There is coming a new world altogether, and we may taste it even now. Isaiah sees into the future and sees what God will do after the Assyrians are defeated.
- ¹The desert and the parched land will be glad about them; the wilderness will rejoice and blossom.

'Them' refers to the people of God. When God's people are blessed, even creation rejoices over them.

Like the crocus,
²it will burst into bloom;
it will rejoice greatly and shout for joy.
The glory of Lebanon will be given to it,
the splendour of Carmel and Sharon;
they will see the glory of Yahweh,
the splendour of our God.

How is this fulfilled? It is partly a vision of the final `new heavens and new earth' that will come at the end of the world when Jesus returns. But we must remember what I call 'the panoramic principle' — the principle that says we can get some of the final vision fulfilled even before we get to the final end! Jesus can say to us — even before the end of the world — 'The time has come. The kingdom of God is near. Change your whole viewpoint and believe the good news!'[11]. Even now when life is a wilderness, God can work for us such that the wilderness becomes a garden, with an abundance of flowers and singing and joy! Even now the deserts may become as green as the mountains of Lebanon, as lovely as Mount Carmel's pastures and the plain of Sharon (places which were famous for their fertility and beauty).

God likes to reveal his glory even now. When Jesus comes every eye will see the glory of God, but even before Jesus comes those who have faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are able to see the glorious character of God.

2. We should encourage each other to press forward to get as much of that new world as we can even now.

³Strengthen the feeble hands, steady the knees that give way; ⁴say to those with fearful hearts, 'Be strong, do not fear. Behold your God. He will come with vengeance; with divine retribution he himself will come and he will save you ⁵Then will the eyes of the blind be opened and the ears of the deaf unstopped. ⁶Then will the lame leap like a deer, and the mute tongue shout for joy..'

The blind will see; the deaf will hear. It is true now spiritually. Jesus' miracles were literal but every miracle (then and now) is a sign of what God does spiritually as well as in physical blessing. In the final new heavens and new earth every kind of blindness and deafness will be abolished, but we may know something of that even now. The lame may leap; those who cannot talk may shout. Even in Isaiah's day anyone who looked forward to the coming of a Saviour was able to know a taste of the blessings of the kingdom of God. Now in days of fulfilment we know even more – and yet greater things are to come.

Those who walk on it have already been redeemed and ransomed.

But the redeemed will walk there, ¹⁰and the ransomed of Yahweh will return, and they will come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy will crown their heads. They overtake gladness and joy; and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

We are rejoicing in the foretastes of what is to come to us. We are singing songs of joy. We are little kings who will reign with the great King. He is crowned with many crowns but we are crowned also. Everlasting joy is about to be our crown for ever but we are beginning to wear the crown of joy already. We are rejoicing with a joy that is unspeakable and full of glory. One day 'sorrow and sighing' will disappear for ever but they are beginning to disappear already. The Saviour has come; we are enjoying foretastes of glory!

Dr Michael Eaton (1942-2017) was highly respected internationally as a theologian, author, preacher and teacher. Born in the UK, he lived for many years in Kenya where he became a citizen. He was one of the leaders of the Chrisco Fellowship in Nairobi.
