1. God's

faithfulness will not allow The prophet is still addressing the discouragement of Zion. A believer being chastised by God feels as if he or she is forsaken by God. Isaiah foresees a time when Zion will say, 'Yahweh has forsaken me.' But it is not so. God does not forsake his people.

1. God's faithfulness will not allow him to divorce us. No bill of divorce can be produced, for God never divorces his people.

¹This is what Yahweh says: him to divorce *Where is your mother's certificate of divorce* with which I sent her away? US Or to which of my creditors did I sell you?
